ECONOMIC MOBILITY


Almost **45% of respondents** reported that conditions for economic mobility had worsened in the previous year, and 30% expected them to worsen in 2024.

EMPLOYMENT


More than **40%** of respondents surveyed in 2023 indicated that labor market conditions had improved over the previous year, and more than 45% expected them to improve in the near term. But almost half of respondents reported job-quality conditions to be poor.


- Barriers to entry



ORGANIZATIONS SERVING LMI COMMUNITIES


More than 70% of organizations said their ability to continue serving LMI communities was good, even though demand had increased in the previous year.

Financial health was steady or improving for most organizations, but more than one-third said they were facing at least some stress.
