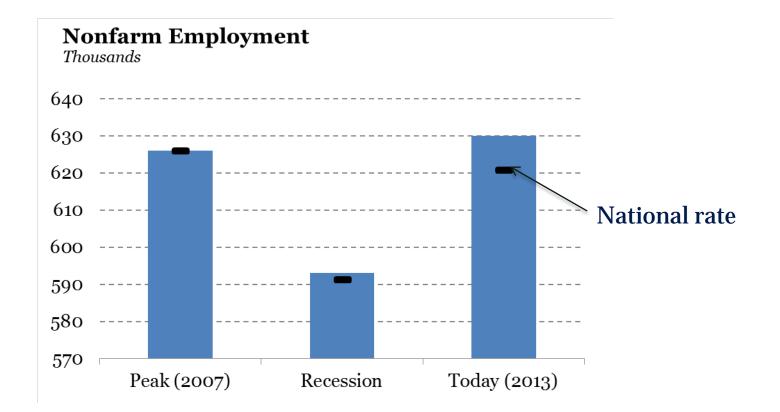

So what is different?

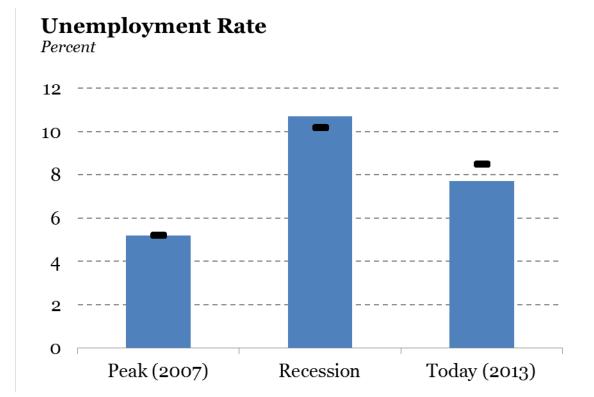

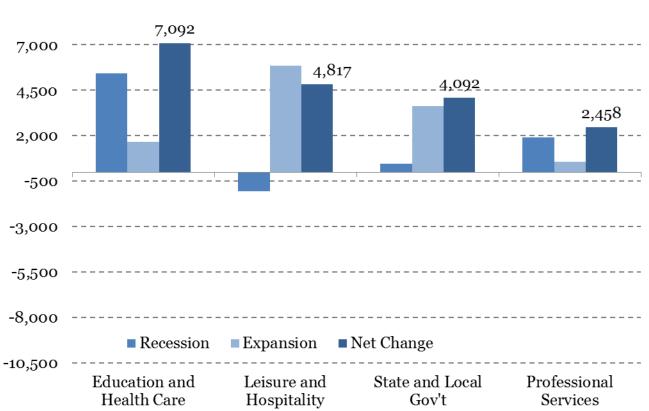

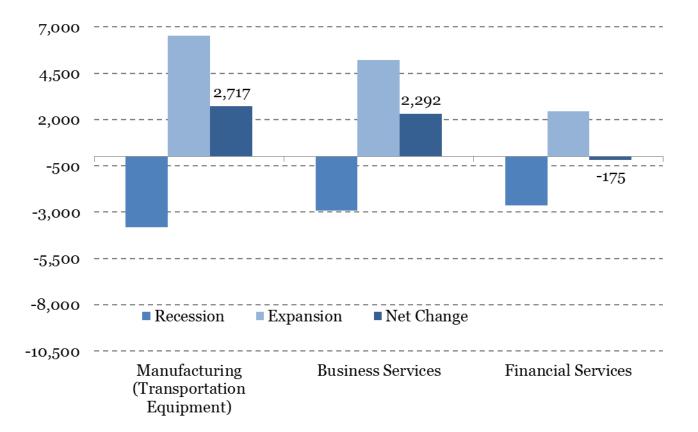

Louisville Employment by Sector, Jobs

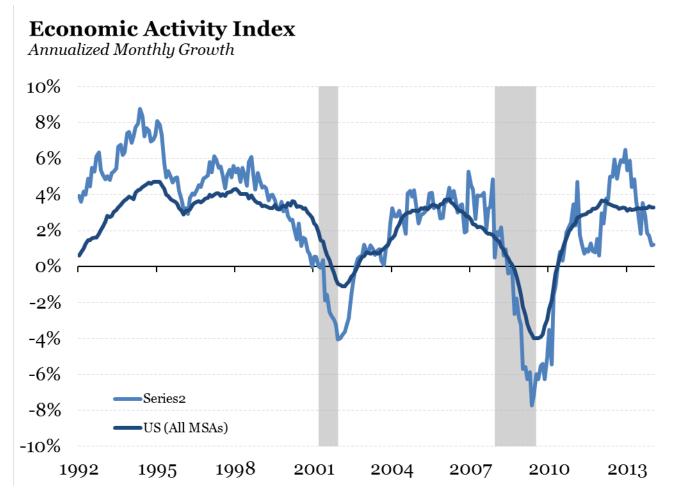

 - Extract common trend: "business cycle"
 - Scale index to "GDP" measure

A closer look at 2013

- About 1.3% growth
- +7,600 jobs
- Unemployment rate ticked up
- Wages stagnate (then slip)
- Continued weakness in housing and construction
- National economy didn't help...

A look forward

- Six places to look:
 - Recent history
 - Housing and construction
 - Healthcare sector
 - Manufacturing
 - Anecdotal information

What history tells us

- Average job growth during the recovery:
- 2010-2013: 9,300 jobs (1.5%)
- 2012 = 20,000 jobs (3.3%)
- 2013 = 7,600 jobs (1.2%)

Housing and Construction

- Is 2014 the year for more construction jobs?
- National growth has been 3% per year

....that would be 1,000 jobs

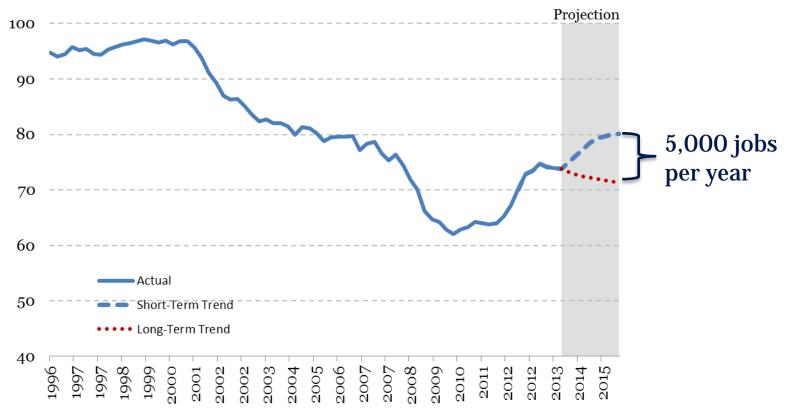
Healthcare Uncertainty

- Hiring has slowed to a trickle in 2013
- Layoffs announced
- 2014 is likely another slow year
- Aging population: positive long-term outlook

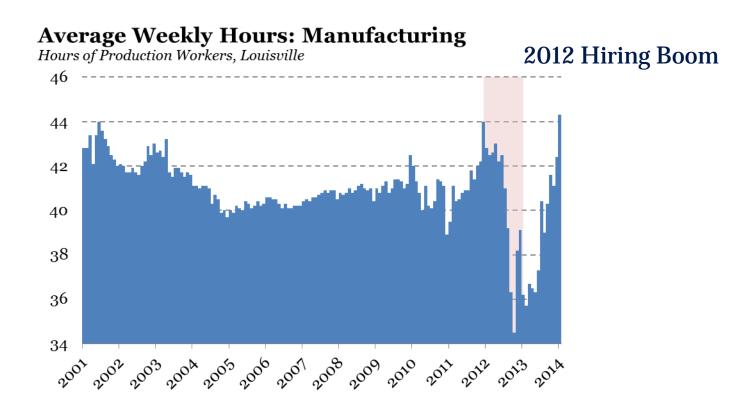
Can manufacturing buck the long-term trend?

Thousands of Jobs

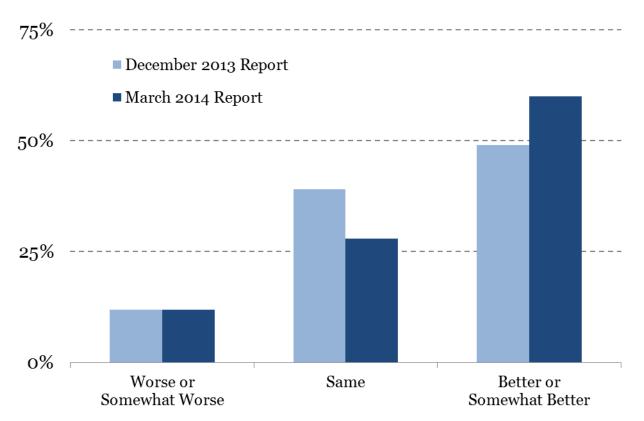


Hours are at a 14 year high

Looking ahead: 2014

- If activity picks up (3.0% GDP), Louisville should outperform the nation.
- My projection is for about 12,000 jobs or 1.9% growth
- National pace expected around 1.6% growth
